### BUSINESS SPOTLIGHT



**P**ACE is pleased to recognize Bobbie Parr of Parrs Jars located on Princess Street in Dryden as our feature business this quarter.

Bobbie came to PACE in 2020 with concerns about food security in Northwestern Ontario. She comes from a background of community development and is passionate about growing the local food movement.

With the supply chain increasingly unstable, a direct result of the COVID-19 pandemic, Bobbie has seen a need for more accessible ways to shop and support the local farm producers. With many people staying home through 2020

and 2021, a need for online ordering and contactless pick up was preferred, especially for the vulnerable who wanted to avoid the larger grocery stores. Since launching her website and opening her space on Princess Street, the business has flourished adding farm subscriptions and local food sales, educational programs and workshops, kitchen and cold storage rentals for local producers and she also grows food year-round at her small farm in Wabigoon.

Parrs Jars provides local vegetables all year long including micro greens, edible blossoms, pickles, seasonal garden vegetables and living greens. Bobbie believes in supporting other local entrepreneurs and producers so also has non-homogenized dairy in glass jars from a Thunder Bay producer available for purchase through her website.


